INTRODUCTION

Outsourcing is not a new phenomenon and it has been happening for quite some time. Firms are deciding to outsource their information technology for different reasons. The main area of this research study offers an in-depth analysis on why and how small to medium firms in Malta outsource their IT functions and the impact outsourcing has on the firms.

Furthermore, this study seeks to understand and determine how to outsource their IT functions and to what extent. This research study also delves into how the firms look at outsourcing, if it is just another means to spend more money or a valued option. The benefits and risks with IT outsourcing are also tackled in order to understand why such a decision is taken.

AIM

The focus of this research is the small to medium firms which make up 99.8% of the Maltese Island's enterprise. In Malta, most of the firms go through the whole process of a product and/or service unlike larger firms where they are focused on doing one thing. There are various studies on outsourcing, but one of the key issues is that most research studies discuss large firms, mostly multi-million firms, which we do not have in Malta.

Furthermore, most of the studies tackle issues when having a large firm with definite core-competences. This does not happen in Malta, since most of the firms are small to medium and do far more than one core discipline. In fact, in most cases, the firms are concerned with the whole process of a service or a product from start to finish.

OBEJCTIVES


The objectives pertaining to this study are:

RESEARCH METHOLOGY

The research methodology applied in this research study is Grounded theory as an inductive method and using the conditional matrix by Corbin and Strauss's (2015) in order to analyse the data gathered. Grounded theory is used because this research study is a business process and therefore in-depth analysis is used and because the researcher needs to be close to the participants.

4 firms are analysed using in-depth face-to-face interviews with open-ended questions with the chosen owner/managers of different firms. The data from the interviews is analysed for different concepts to emerge. There is little research with regards to small to medium firms in small island states like Malta and therefore this research can help to fill this literature gap.

RESULTS
