I am Luke Camilleri, better known as Funky Monkey, and I have dedicated my life to Malta's independent music and creative scene. As a music producer, DJ, visual storyteller, and founder of 141 Records, my creative identity was shaped in no small part by my time at MCAST. I always knew I did not fit into a single genre, and MCAST gave me the space and the tools to experiment across sound, visuals and storytelling. That freedom made all the difference.

MY JOURNEY with MCAST began in 2014 when I enrolled in the BTEC Extended Diploma in Creative Media Production. From there, I progressed to the Higher Diploma and later completed the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Creative Media Production. Over the course of five years, I explored not only the technical aspects of media but also its narrative power, learning to tell stories that challenge conventions, celebrate diversity, and provoke thought. From video editing and sound design to visual theory and collaborative projects, MCAST gave me a well-rounded creative education. The lecturers, equipment, and practical exposure all helped me bridge the gap between education and the real-world demands of the music and media industries.

In 2014, while still a student, I founded 141 Records, an independent label built on the principle that music should never be boxed in by genre. What began as a personal platform soon grew into a collective movement, offering support, production, and exposure for a wide range of Maltese artists. Today, 141 Records houses talent across electronic, pop, hip hop, punk, and experimental genres, becoming a hub for young creatives to collaborate, grow, and find their voice.

My identity as Funky Monkey extends far beyond DJing and production. I am also a beatboxer, drummer, performer, sound designer, and music video director, often combining these skills to create immersive performances and media projects. My single Robustus and collaborations with artists like REA, Sempliciment Tat-Triq, Lil-Jun, Myles, DEM, and Oxygyn reflect my commitment to pushing creative boundaries while staying rooted in community and culture. In 2017, I was selected for Artivisti, a national programme by Arts Council Malta and

Aġenzija Żgħażaġħ that supports promising creatives. Through mentoring, a professional residency, and funding, I was able to expand my projects, further validating the foundation MCAST helped me build.

My story is not just about musical talent, but also about resilience, self-direction, and the courage to be original. From producing politically engaged tracks like Roulette to organizing underground events and supporting emerging artists, my career is a testament to how education, when aligned with passion, can transform lives. MCAST did not just teach me how to use software or equipment—it helped me find my voice as a creator. That experience continues to shape how I approach every project today.

To current and future students, my message is simple: do not be afraid to break the rules—creatively, not irresponsibly. Your uniqueness is your superpower. MCAST gives you the tools, but you must build the path. Be yourself, be creative, bir-relax u ejja minn hemm.

Today, I am the Founder and Creative Director of 141 Records, an independent producer and performer under the alias Funky Monkey, and I collaborate with some of Malta's leading indie and underground artists. I continue to host workshops, organize events, and produce music across a wide spectrum of genres. Alongside this, I also work in television and film productions as part of the sound and art departments. Through all of this, I remain committed to blending music, activism, and visual storytelling into bold creative statements that inspire the next generation of creatives.

KAIJI MA

JUNIOR AIRCRAFT MECHANIC

My name is Kaiji Ma, and I studied the Aircraft Maintenance course at MCAST. I clearly remember the workshop sessions with Lecturer Carmelo Psaila, a former Malta Air Force air-sea rescue pilot and licensed aircraft maintenance engineer certified by EASA (European Union Aviation Safety Agency), with 25 years of aviation experience. His patience and professionalism left a deep impression on me.

BEFORE EVERY session, we would check the 30 tools on the workbench one by one against the tool list—from steel rulers and vernier calipers to safety goggles and ear protection—to make sure nothing was missing. After the session, we repeated the process and signed off. That awareness of safety is something I still uphold in my work today.

At MCAST, each lecturer brought a unique professional background and could explain complex theories in an engaging and easy-to-understand way through vivid examples. For instance, in Lecturer Marjohn Demanuele's electronics sessions, we built circuits on breadboards (a tool used for quickly assembling and testing electronic circuits without soldering) according to diagrams and then measured waveforms using oscilloscopes (devices for displaying and analyzing electrical signals); in the workshop, we machined metal parts by hand. This hands-on approach is one of MCAST's hallmarks. Another defining feature is the apprenticeship system, which allowed us to quickly apply classroom knowledge to real work, deepen our understanding, and lay a solid foundation for future employment.

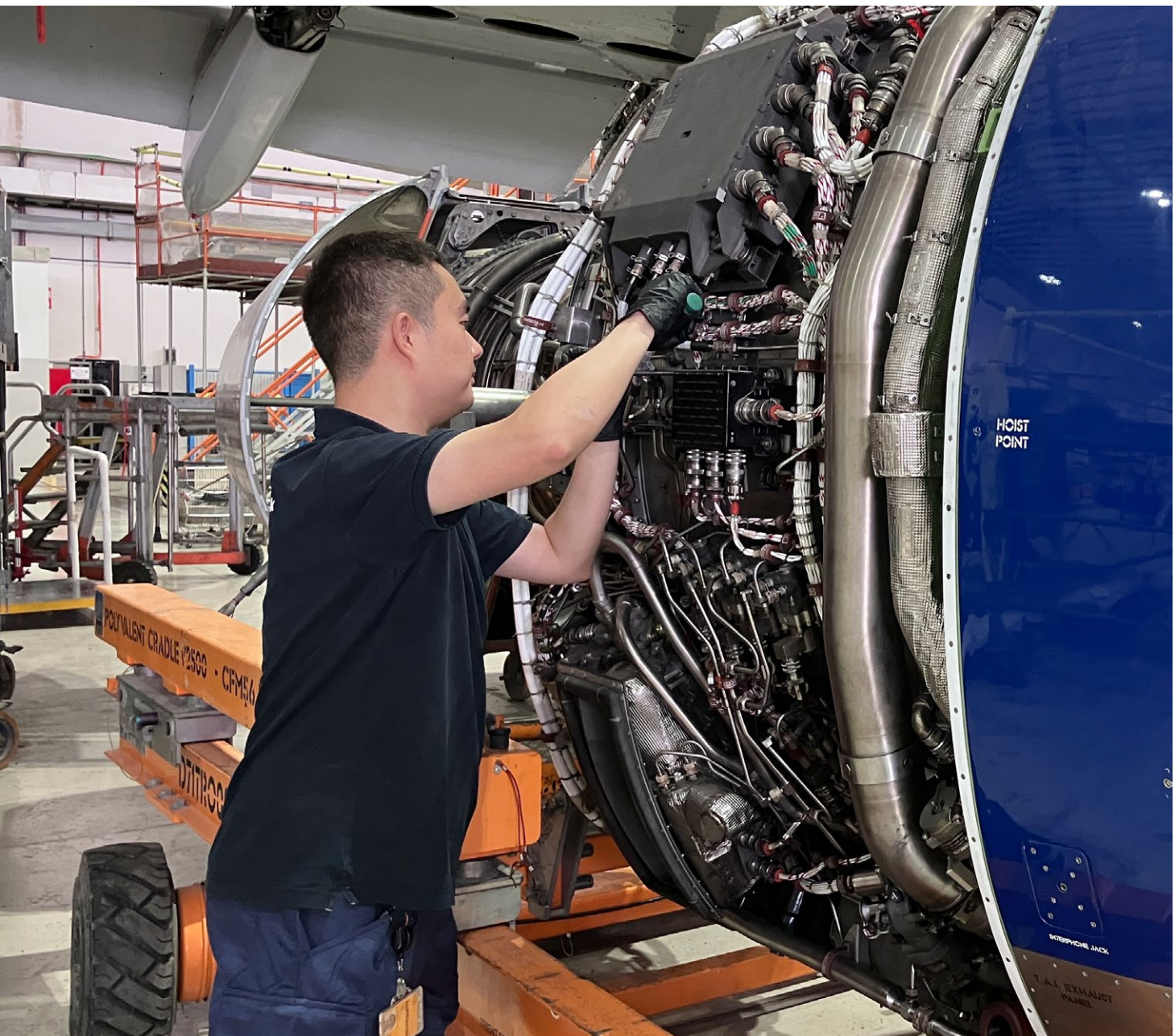
In our aerodynamics course, we met a special lecturer—Dr.

Leonardo Barilaro from Italy, known as “The Space Pianist.” He leads the ASTROBEAT project, funded by Xjenza Malta, which explores the use of cold welding technology to repair spacecraft exteriors damaged by high-speed micrometeoroids or debris in space.

In May 2024, I was fortunate to join my peers at the “Malta in Space” event, hosted by MCAST Institute of Engineering and Transport, which focused on space research and its aerospace applications. This occasion marked Malta's first-ever participation in a space mission, with both MCAST and the University of Malta among the institutions contributing to such projects.

Outside the lecture hall, MCAST also focused on developing our comprehensive skills. In the Employability and Entrepreneurial Skills course, our group created a video proposal for a “Malta Bus App,” using big data to optimize the bus system—improving efficiency while exploring environmental and commercial value.

In the Community Social Responsibility course, we took part in volunteer service, met new friends, experienced the value of contributing to society, and shared our experiences and lessons gained in class.





In April 2024, I joined fellow students from the MCAST Institute of Engineering and Transport in the Euroscola programme at the European Parliament in Strasbourg, France, where we debated, negotiated, amended, and voted on topics such as democracy with peers from EU member states and other regions. This experience strengthened my critical thinking and communication skills, and deepened my understanding of democratic decision-making.

Later that summer, I spent three weeks in Vilnius, Lithuania, on an Erasmus internship at an aircraft parts maintenance company. I worked on tasks such as disassembling and maintaining tyres and brake systems, inspecting bolts, nuts, and O-rings, and improving my locking wire skills. In my spare time, I explored cultural sites, enjoyed traditional foods, attended local festivals, and even stumbled upon a marathon, experiencing the charm of different cultures.

To me, MCAST is like a bridge connecting two shores—one is the lecture hall and campus life, the other is the workplace and the wider world. Regardless of background, every student can choose the courses and projects that suit them best. This openness, equality, and inclusiveness took me from scientific research (such as the MPOMS field survey) to the European Parliament, and then to an Erasmus internship—step by step bringing what I learned in the classroom into real industry scenarios.

After graduation, I began my full-time career at Lufthansa Technik Malta. At the start, the company provided safety training covering chemical handling, tool operation, and emergency response. The rigorous habits I developed at MCAST continued here—any item removed from an aircraft, no matter how small, must have a detailed tag indicating its name, source, date, destination, and a stamp for confirmation, just as precise as MCAST's tool checks.

Initially, I worked in the Cabin Department, performing tasks such as removing cabin components, conducting system inspections, corrosion prevention, and lubrication.

In May 2025, I was honoured to attend the annual engineering conference “Engineering the Skies | Breaking New Ground in Aerospace Innovation” organized by the Chamber of Engineers and held at the Hilton Hotel in St. Julian's. The conference

brought together engineers, industry representatives, and partners in the aviation and aerospace fields to discuss topics such as safety and reliability, space innovation, local development, and future opportunities.

That familiar sound of metal striking echoes once again in the hangars of Lufthansa Technik Malta, carrying forward the melody from my MCAST days. What has not changed is our commitment to quality and the responsibility for passengers' lives. When we see the aircraft we have maintained soaring into the blue sky, a sense of accomplishment swells in us—we are proud of our work.

I take this opportunity to extend my most sincere thanks to all the lecturers and colleagues who have helped me along the way. I will now continue to play my own notes on this journey.

Studying at MCAST was a positive and enriching experience. The lecturers were skilled in their respective fields, particularly in grounded theory, which was the methodology emphasised during my Master's in Research Methods. Their expertise, combined with a practical approach to teaching, significantly enhanced my learning process.

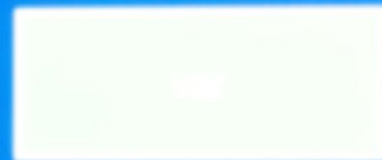
THROUGHOUT THE course, strong skills in both qualitative and quantitative research methods were acquired. The structured pathway, starting from the Postgraduate Certificate, progressing to the Postgraduate Diploma and culminating in the Master in Research Methods, provided a thorough and gradual development of research competence. This journey enabled a deep understanding of systematic data collection and analysis, grounded theory methodology and effective academic writing.

MCAST contributed significantly to professional success by offering well-managed courses that remain updated to reflect current research standards. As a lecturer mentoring undergraduate research, completing this programme enhanced mentoring practices, enabling a more critical and structured approach when guiding students in their dissertations and projects. Although there were occasional challenges, such as delays in the issuance of marks due to industrial directives, staff remained understanding and supportive throughout.

I highly recommend pursuing the Postgraduate Certificate in Research Methods at MCAST. The practical and methodological insights I gained were invaluable for my role as a lecturer and researcher. This programme truly helps develop deeper quantitative and qualitative research skills that are essential in academia and beyond.

KINDERGARTEN EDUCATOR

My name is Victoria Gauci, and I graduated from MCAST Gozo Campus in 2021 after completing the Level 5 Higher Diploma in Advanced Studies in the Early Years.

FROM A very young age, I envisioned myself becoming an Early Years educator. The idea of teaching young children, supporting their development, and watching them grow, has always intrigued and inspired me. I have always wanted to be someone who helps others achieve their goals—and being a teacher allows me to do just that.

My journey at MCAST Gozo Campus began in 2019 when I enrolled in the Level 4 Advanced Diploma in Children's Care, Learning and Development. With a strong passion and determination to advance in the Early Years sector, I went on to complete the Level 5 Higher Diploma in Advanced Studies in the Early Years.

After completing my studies in 2021, I took the next step in my academic path by applying to the University of Malta to pursue a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Early Childhood Education and Care. At the time, MCAST Gozo Campus did not offer this degree course.

MCAST Gozo Campus played a pivotal role in shaping me into the educator I am today. The hands-on approach, practical experiences, and foundational knowledge I gained there were instrumental in my development. MCAST places strong emphasis on real-world learning opportunities, which greatly helped when it came to applying theory in practice.

Throughout my studies, I had the opportunity to participate in teaching practice placements, which allowed me to apply

classroom knowledge to real educational settings. These experiences were invaluable in helping me grow personally and professionally, and in reflecting on my future role as an educator. I learned a great deal from the experienced teachers who I worked alongside with during these placements.

The support and guidance I received from the lecturers at MCAST were outstanding. I am deeply grateful for their professionalism, dedication, and encouragement. Although my journey at MCAST presented its challenges, it was ultimately rewarding. The lecturers consistently went above and beyond to help students succeed, and without their ongoing support, achieving my Level 5 qualification would not have been possible.

Thanks to the solid foundation I received at MCAST Gozo Campus, I now work as a Kindergarten Teacher at St. Theresa Kercem Church School. The skills and knowledge I gained, especially in designing enriching activities and understanding child development, continue to shape the way I teach and support the children in my care.

MARKETING EXECUTIVE

My time at MCAST was more than just an academic experience: it was a journey of growth, adaptability and professional development. I pursued a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Business Enterprise, a programme that offered a comprehensive foundation across key business areas such as accountancy, business administration, marketing and purchasing. Another standout aspect of my MCAST journey was its emphasis on real-world experience. The institution did not just prepare us with academic theory; it actively encouraged us to get involved in the industry early on. At just 18 years old, I began my first internship in the marketing field, a rare and valuable opportunity in such a competitive industry. MCAST's push for internships helped me gain hands-on experience while still studying, giving me an early advantage in understanding how the marketing world operates in practice, not just in textbooks.

The marketing industry places a high value on experience, and I am grateful that MCAST prioritised that from the start. Thanks to this practical focus, I graduated not only with knowledge, but with confidence, adaptability and relevant work experience that set me apart from other candidates.

Looking back, I can confidently say that MCAST went above and beyond, even during a global crisis, to ensure we received a full and enriching educational experience. It laid the groundwork for my professional success and gave me a head start in building the career I envisioned.

My name is Kyah Formosa, and in November 2025 I will proudly graduate with a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Inclusive Education from MCAST's Institute of Community Services.

MY JOURNEY at MCAST began in 2022, after spending several years working in jobs that, while stable, left me feeling professionally unfulfilled. I had always nurtured a passion for the education sector and a desire to work in a role that allowed me to make a meaningful difference. Eventually, I took the important step to pursue this calling and return to education.

Enrolling in the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Inclusive Education was a transformative experience. The course offered a strong foundation in both academic theory and practical application, preparing me to work confidently with students from all backgrounds and abilities. I gained a deep understanding of individual learning needs and inclusive teaching strategies, and I learned how to create classroom environments where every learner feels seen, valued and supported.

A major highlight of my studies was the practical placement component. Over the duration of the programme, I had the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in primary schools, secondary schools and a resource centre. LANCE BOMBARDIER, ARMED FORCES OF MALTA



My journey with MCAST began nine years ago, following the completion of secondary school with a Secondary School Leaving Certificate, when I enrolled in the Foundation Course in Engineering Skills, Level 2, at the MCAST Gozo Campus. After successfully completing this one-year programme, I progressed to the Level 3 Diploma in Mechanical Engineering, committing another year to my studies.

SHORTLY AFTER, life took a new turn when I became a parent. I paused my academic journey to focus on raising my daughter, but thanks to the skills and knowledge I had gained at MCAST, I was able to secure employment as a full-time soldier in the Armed Forces of Malta. I was posted to the 3rd Regiment in Hal Safi, working within the Combat Engineering Squadron, specifically in the Electrical and Plumbing section. There, I was given the role of assistant electrician, an opportunity that built directly on what I had learned at MCAST. In 2021, my superiors gave me a great opportunity. They supported me to go back to MCAST Gozo and study the Advanced Diploma in Electrical Systems (Level 4). It was a three-year course, during which I continued working full-time as a soldier while studying.

During my time at MCAST Gozo, while working full-time as a soldier in Malta, I continued to learn more about my job and gain experience. Thanks to MCAST, I was able to do my apprenticeship with the Armed Forces of Malta (AFM), which helped me apply what I was learning in class directly to real-life situations. The course helped me understand how electrical systems work, how to install them correctly, how to fix common faults, and how to follow safety rules. These skills are very important in my daily work with the AFM, especially when dealing with complex electrical systems in military buildings. The hands-on training I received both at MCAST and during my apprenticeship gave me more confidence and made me more independent. I started taking on more responsibility at work, and I felt more prepared to solve problems on my own. The support from my MCAST lecturers and my supervisors in the Army played a big part in my personal and professional growth.

Having completed the Level 4 Advanced Diploma in Electrical Systems, now I am better positioned to aim for higher positions in the Army, through eventual opportunities that will allow me to advance further in my career. MCAST gave me a golden, second opportunity after having completed secondary education with no formal qualifications. MCAST believed in me and helped me to believe in myself and in my own potential. Lecturers were helpful and supportive all along. They gave me the support I needed to balance work, study and family life. If you are thinking of studying at MCAST, do not hesitate ... go for it. Do not let your past and your previous educational failures hold you back. I started with almost nothing, and today I have a stable job, a family and a future. With hard work and support, anything is possible.

Ever since I was a child, I was fascinated by how things worked. I spent hours solving puzzles and building with LEGO, unknowingly laying the foundation for what would become a lifelong passion for engineering. I have always been a hands-on learner, so when the time came to choose a college, MCAST was the natural choice. I wanted to be in an environment that blended theory with real workshop experience, and MCAST did not disappoint.

DURING MY time as a mechanical engineering student, I was most at home in the workshop. I especially fell in love with lathe and milling machines. The hands-on sessions were what made the learning come alive for me. But what truly made my MCAST experience unforgettable was the bond between students and lecturers. The support, guidance and encouragement I received from my tutors helped me develop not only as a student, but also as a person.

The practical training I received had proven to be invaluable in industry.



RYAN FALZON

ARTIST

AUTHOR

ART EDUCATOR



I am Ryan Falzon, an award-winning visual artist, published author, and art educator. My journey in the arts began in 2007 when I enrolled at MCAST's Institute for the Creative Arts in Mosta. The first two years were rooted in exploration: I worked across various workshops in jewellery, clay, wood and metal, while also receiving solid grounding in drawing and art history. The lecturers were more than just teachers; they were practitioners, all-rounders who nurtured our development from every angle.



IN 2009, I became part of the first cohort to enrol in MCAST's newly launched Fine Art course, which later evolved into the first Fine Art degree offered at the institution in collaboration with the Fraunhofer-Gesellschaft Institute. This period marked a turning point for me. We were mentored by academics and artists from the Bauhaus and the Mannheim University of Applied Sciences. Their guidance shaped my identity as an artist. I was exposed to applied research, the professional role of the artist, and the entrepreneurial mindset needed to survive in this field. It broadened my perspective and gave me the discipline to take seriously painting, which it quickly emerged as my core medium and creative outlet.

After MCAST, I spent time working in Berlin, while maintaining a studio practice in Malta. Inspired by the MCAST spirit of collaboration and community, I co-founded the Xarolla Windmill Project in Żurrieq, a multidisciplinary platform for emerging artists rooted in the idea of shared space, community engagement and artistic development. In 2014, I was selected by Absolut Vodka for their global "Transform Today" campaign, representing Malta among a group of international creatives. I continued to build on the body of work I had started at MCAST, taking part in numerous solo and collective exhibitions both locally and internationally. My work is now held in public and private collections.

From 2016 to 2019, I presented a series of solo exhibitions, Quick Fix: A Morality Tale (2016), We Lost the War (2017), and Culture is Past, Art is Future (2018), which have become reference points in contemporary Maltese political and socially engaged art. Since 2020, my focus has shifted towards painting plants and gardens in domestic settings, exploring themes of biophilia and post-pandemic living. My work has been exhibited internationally at events such as Ostrale Biennale (Dresden, 2019, 2023, 2025) and WATERGATE: From Water to Land, From Land to Water (Rijeka European Capital of Culture, 2020), as well as the first edition of maltabiennale.art (2024).

Today, I continue working as a practising visual artist while also teaching at both secondary and post-secondary levels within the private sector.

Looking back, MCAST was essential in shaping my path and professionalising my practice. It offered hands-on experience, diverse approaches, and the kind of one-to-one mentorship that helped me develop both personally and artistically. It gave me a clear sense of identity and direction. Thanks to my qualification from MCAST, I was also able to continue my academic journey and pursue a Master of Arts in Fine Arts at the University of Malta.

Art, for me, is not just a career, it is a way of life. And MCAST played a key role in helping me carve that life out.

ANTHONY DEBATTISTA

HEAD OF CORPORATE

My educational journey at MCAST began when I enrolled in the Health and Social Care Management degree. This course was a turning point in my life, equipping me not only with the clinical knowledge needed for the healthcare sector but also with invaluable insight into the administrative and managerial aspects of the industry.

DURING MY time at MCAST, I gained a solid grounding in leadership, teamwork, and strategic thinking skills that have been crucial throughout my career. One of the most significant aspects of the course was the placement opportunity.
